



The winner of over a dozen major awards, Percival Everett is the author of 24 novels, including *Erasure*, the basis for the award-winning film *American Fiction*. His most recent novel, *James*, reinterprets Mark Twain's *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* from the perspective of the enslaved runaway Jim. *James* was shortlisted for the 2024 Booker Prize and on November 20, 2024, received the National Book Award for Fiction. Everett has also written highly regarded short fiction and poetry. Among his recent novels are *Dr. No*,

which received the 2023 PEN/Jean Stein Book Award; *The Trees*, a finalist for the Booker Prize; and *Telephone*, a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize. Percival Everett was born in Georgia, raised in South Carolina, and educated at the University of Miami and Brown University. He is now Distinguished Professor of English at the University of Southern California.
